OVERVIEW

Every child deserves a chance to fall in love with reading.

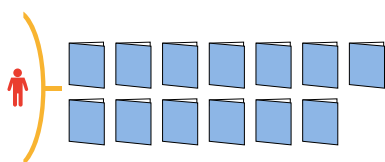
The reality is that students from low-income families have fewer books – there is just 1 book for every 300 children. These children are less likely to read proficiently by third grade, a key predictor of future academic success.

Locally, more than 5,500 third grade students were not reading at grade level during the 2016-17 academic year. At United Way of the Midlands, we understand how important it is to put books in these students' hands. To ensure more children are on track to succeed in school and life, we partnered with Book Trust to bring books to nearly 2,200 K-3rd graders in ten Title 1 schools across six school districts.

HOW IT WORKS

United Way of the Midlands is honored to partner with Book Trust, a successful, nation-wide literacy program. This dynamic program increases access to reading materials, empowers teachers to create a classroom culture of literacy and inspires students to read.

The Book Trust program focuses on three core components to build reading engagement and increase student reading achievement:

Empowering Choice: Choice is at the heart of Book Trust's approach to supporting student literacy efforts. With a stipend of \$7 a month, students scour the Scholastic Reading Club flier to choose books based on their personal interests. This leads to increased motivation and more focused interest in reading.

Building a Culture of Literacy: Classroom-wide celebrations mark the arrival of book orders each month, reinforcing the value of reading. Selecting and receiving books each month as a classroom cultivates group reading among students and encourages the development of active listening skills, new vocabulary and respect for others.

Engaging Families: Students take their books home each month to read to and with family members. By the end of the school year, students build a home library of 20-30 books and families increase their engagement in reading.

4X Children who aren't reading on grade-level by the end of third grade are four times more likely to drop out of school.

6X The same children are six times more likely to drop out of school if they have lived in poverty for a year.
